Narwhal Fun Facts!

The Narwhal is also called the *Unicorn of the Sea*.

Male narwhals possess a great spiraled tooth that projects from their heads.

The long, hornlike tooth can reach up to 10 feet in length and grows continually to replace wear.

The Narwhals tusk is more commonly found on males, is actually an enlarged tooth with sensory capability and up to 10 million nerve endings inside. Some narwhals have up to two tusks, while others have none.

Narwhals live year-round in the Arctic waters around Greenland, Canada and Russia.

They can weigh up to 4200 pounds and grow as long as 17 feet in length.

Unlike some whale species that migrate, narwhals spend their lives in the Arctic.

Narwhals travel in groups. Their pods average 15-20 whales.

Narwhals feed more regularly in the winter, consuming cod, halibut, shrimp, and squid.


In the summer, narwhals feed rarely, having stored up enough energy during the winter feeding season.

Narwhals are preyed upon by polar bears and walruses if they get trapped by shifting ice. Offshore they are attacked by orcas. (They are related to orcas.)

In the summer, narwhals are also hunted by Inuit's using kayaks and spears.


